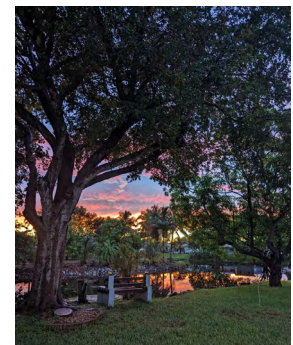

FROM THE MAYOR

Happy New Year, Margate!

Since 1979, our city has attracted seniors from throughout northwest Broward to compete in the annual Senior Games. It is an opportunity for people aged 60 and older to compete in both indoor and outdoor sports, including golf, shuffleboard, Wii bowling, and so much more.

The event allows our seniors to stay active while enjoying serious — but friendly — challenges and compete for medals. It is a chance to bond, not just over the love of sports, but also being part of a village.

The Senior Games is just one of the many events we are committed to hosting throughout the year. For us, it's a quality-of-life issue, ensuring that Margate is a safe and welcoming home for our children, seniors, and everyone in between.

To continue offering programs like the Senior Games that you want and need, I'd like to point out page 8 of this edition of Our Margate, where we break down how your property taxes are allocated.

It's how we keep the streets clean, the flowers blooming, City Hall open, the Calypso Cove water park staffed, and fire and police with the latest technology, equipment and training to be there when you need them.

The Broward School District collects 32%; water and hospital districts and the Children's Services Council collect a combined 9%; and Broward County (which funds regional services including libraries, the Broward Addiction Recovery Center, the Medical Examiner's Office, affordable housing, homeless services, regional parks, the Property Appraiser's Office, the Inspector General, Clerk of Courts, Broward Sheriff's Office, Animal Care and Adoption, water and wastewater, mosquito control, and Visit Lauderdale, which handles tourism), collects 26%.

Our city portion is 33% of the property tax bill and funds improvements and maintenance to city parks, police personnel and equipment, firefighters and the tools to do their job, street repair and maintenance, Parks and



Recreation special events and festivals, the Calypso Cove water park, code enforcement, and so much more. We provide free paint at several giveaways, and we also keep the medians blooming — all in an effort to keep Margate looking good.

We are committed to spending your tax dollars wisely and judiciously, and to continuing to provide you with the services you need and want.

Best wishes for a tremendous 2026.

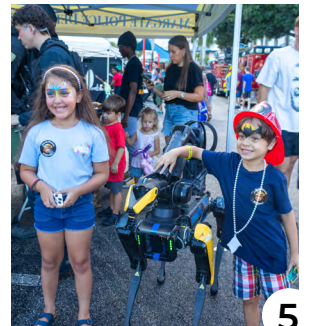
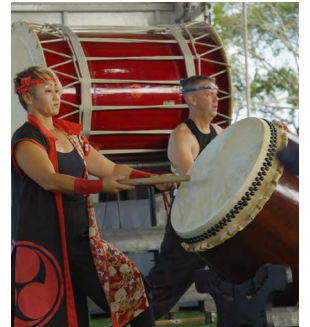

Shaping the Heart of Margate: City Center Project Kicks Off with Community Input

A new City Center is in the works for Margate, bringing a transformative project envisioned for up to 50 acres in the area of State Road 7 and Margate Boulevard.

The vision includes a possible boardwalk, walking trails and bike paths, playground, water feature, community gathering space, and art sculpture. It will be pedestrian-friendly, located at what will become a "Main and Main," as a vibrant retail, food and beverage destination. City Center will be built in three phases, and ground-breaking could be as early as 2027.

As part of this ongoing work, the first community meeting in this process took place in October. Representatives from development partner Brookfield Properties unveiled early renderings of what the space could become. They walked residents through potential design elements, listened closely to community feedback, and answered questions about what lies ahead in the planning process.

City Manager Cale Curtis, who also serves as the Executive Director of the Community Redevelopment Agency, says the project is envisioned as a "vibrant mixed-use" with restaurants, entertainment, and living spaces.



Curtis refers to it as an "eatertainment" spot, a term that combines "eating" and "entertainment" to describe a dining experience that goes beyond just food.

The combination of residential and retail uses will be thoughtfully arranged to bring new energy to this key area of the city and South Florida.



While many details are still being shaped, one thing is clear: resident feedback is front and center — and ongoing.

Renderings shown are conceptual and for illustrative purposes. Final design and features are subject to change as planning progresses.

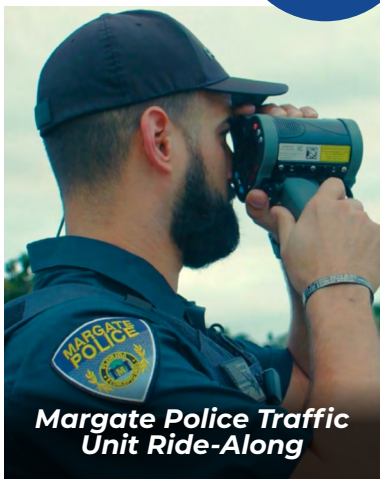

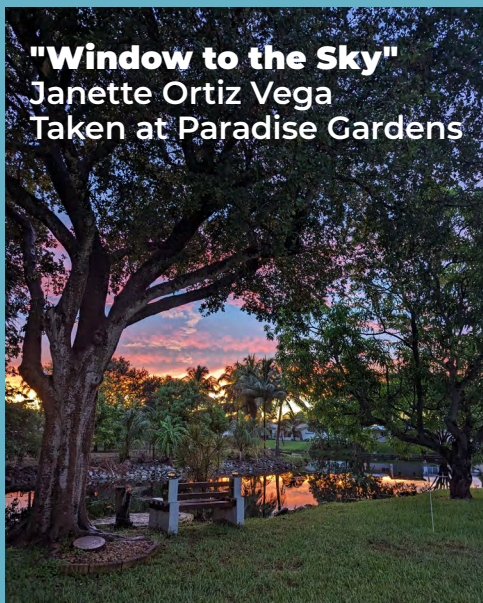
WHERE DO YOUR PROPERTY TAXES GO?

Eyes in the Sky: Margate Police Drones Boost Safety Responses

It's a bird, it's a plane, it's a... drone!

The Margate Police Department has four drones ready to assist in finding missing people and other search and rescue operations. The drones are also used for disaster response assessment. More could be added to the fleet in future years.



One day the drones might even be used as a first responder, comparable to what some other police agencies already do, including the Colorado town of Castle Rock and Miami Beach.

If there's a 911 hangup call in a generic location, the department now sends two police officers, says Sgt. Paul Frankenhauser. But a drone can respond instead, within 45 seconds, to check if help is really needed. It can respond faster

to a traffic accident to alert real uniformed police where resources are needed on the ground. And it can zoom in on a suspect car from more than 100 feet in the air, without endangering the lives of its human officers.



"There are huge officer and public safety implications," says Sgt. Frankenhauser. "It's a bird's eye view of real-time information."

In the case of a missing child, "there are waterways everywhere," says Sgt. Frankenhauser. "It's next to impossible to go down the canals from the street to look for people." With a drone, "in under a minute you can survey a whole canal line and search for people. It's almost like having a helicopter."



Fire Department Expands Fleet with New, Safer Trucks

A brand-new fire (below) engine for Fire Station 18 is the latest addition to the City of Margate Fire Department's fleet.

This truck's new design eliminates the need for a firefighter to be on top of the truck to assist with loading the hose. With the hose now at a lower level, it will help reduce any possible injuries from the hose being repacked over their heads.

In 2026, the department is scheduled to receive two new trucks: a 78-foot ladder Quint Fire Truck and a rescue truck for Fire Station 58.



A new Rescue truck joined the City's fleet in September of 2025 for Fire Station 98. It was one of the first to incorporate a new air filtration device designed to eliminate pathogens from the air and surfaces, creating a disinfected and clean environment for patients.



Division Chief Danny Rodriguez says that the new trucks benefit residents because they reduce the mechanical issues of an aging fleet, so the trucks spend more time on the road doing their job.

"The trucks need to be able to run the calls," he says. "What matters most is reliability, making sure our community is served by modern, state-of-the-art apparatus designed to perform when it counts."

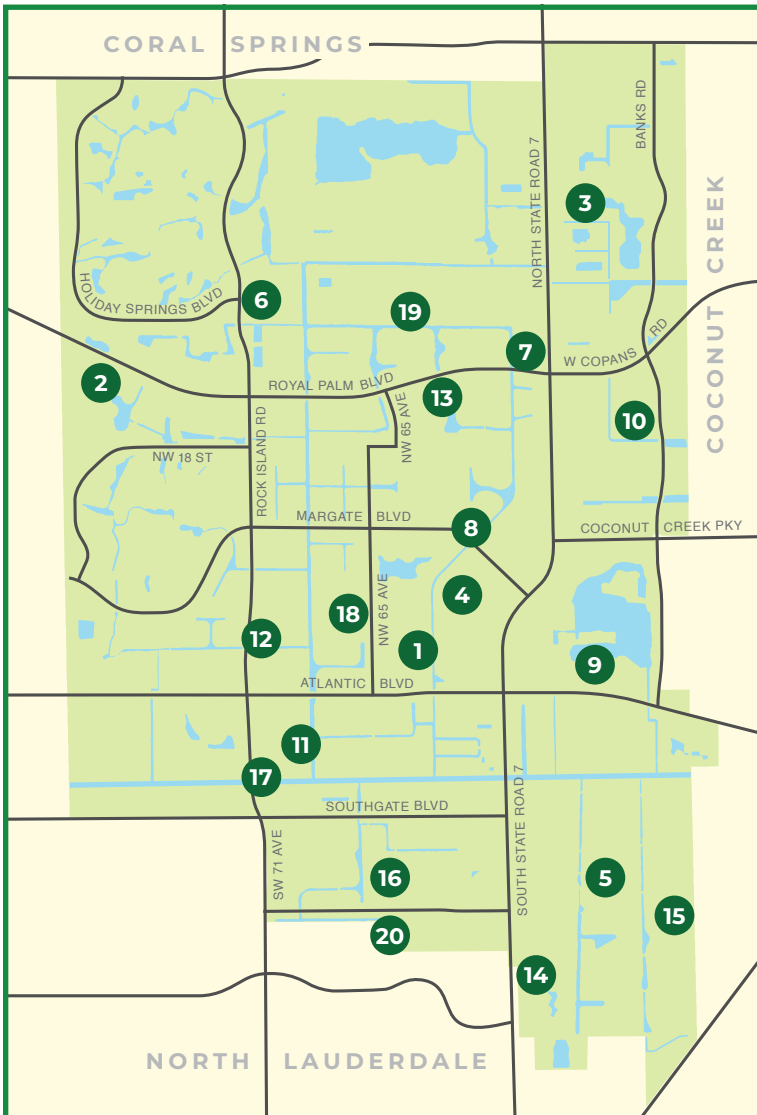

A Bridge Connecting Margate to Neighboring Cities Named for Fallen Soldier

The legacy of SPC Daniel Agami endures as the “bridge” for the love of country.



Daniel, a local who attended the Hebrew Academy Community School in Margate during grades 1-5, now has a state bridge on State Road 7 over Sample Road named in his memory.

Florida Rep. Christine Hunschofsky filed the bill amendment for the renaming, and the governor signed the bill on June 13, 2025. It became law in July.

Daniel joined the military in 2005. The tragedy of Sept. 11, 2001, had fueled his drive to serve, his parents said. “America fights for freedom and survival for the souls of the entire world,” he once said.

Daniel's family was not new to the military; His maternal grandfather had served in the Navy during the Korean War. His father,

an immigrant from Israel, also served in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF).



Daniel, a strapping 6'1" man of “just muscle,” was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 26th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, in Schweinfurt, Germany. Many of his comrades had never met anyone Jewish before him and affectionately referred to him as “G.I. Jew” and “Hebrew Hammer.”

In 2006, he was awarded the Army Commendation Medal with valor after he “acted courageously while being engaged by enemy fire” in northeast Baghdad, Iraq. He returned fire with his machine gun, and was able to kill

one insurgent using his pistol. He was praised in a memo for his “unflinching courage in the face of danger and ability to provide overwhelming firepower and accuracy with his sidearm.”

Daniel was killed with four other soldiers in a Humvee while patrolling Adhamiyah, Iraq on June 21, 2007, when he was 25. The U.S. Department of Defense announced at the time that he died of wounds suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near the vehicle.



At his funeral service at the Star of David Memorial Gardens in North Lauderdale, an Army officer gave his mother a folded flag and numerous awards, including the Purple Heart for being wounded in action, the Bronze Star for his dedication, and a gold star lapel pin.

His name also graces the United States Postal Service, located at 4233 W. Hillsboro Blvd. in Coconut Creek, as the “Army SPC Daniel Agami Post Office Building.” The post office renaming was signed into law in October 2008 by President George W. Bush.

“We are humbled and overjoyed by the dedication of this bridge, which stands as an everlasting legacy to our son — a local hero who made the ultimate sacrifice for our freedoms,” says Daniel's mother, Beth Agami. “Our family chose this particular bridge because it connects three cities, including Margate, that Daniel grew up in and dearly loved. It is a symbol of his journey, his roots, and the community he so proudly served.”

Not only will Daniel's name and memory live on with the bridge renaming, but with his family, too. Daniel's younger brother, Ilan, was just 10 days married and on his honeymoon on a cruise ship, when he got the horrific news that day in 2007. He has since had a son of his own, who is now a teenager.

Denise Steele Creates Home Away from Home for Seniors

On paper, Denise Steele's title at Margate's Northwest Focal Point Senior Center is Activities Coordinator/Special Events Coordinator.

But she's way more than that. She's the chief friend, the top organizer, the eagle eye, the administrator's right hand. She's also known to be the bartender, whipping up mocktails for special events.

"I love it," she whispers. "It's a good place."

For seniors ages 60 and older, the center is a place to be social, keep moving, and stay busy. Denise arranges activities such as arts and crafts, line dance lessons, card games, board games, dominoes, and more. She runs a variety of events to keep it fresh, including an annual International Folk Festival Day, mindful of being inclusive of an array of cultures to make everyone welcome.

"We celebrate everything," she says. "I love being creative. We celebrate every holiday that comes along... we always have parties."

Denise has been with the senior center since June 1984. She was in nursing school at the time, and a professor was looking for a top student for part-time work at the senior center's request. "Would you be interested?" she was asked.

Christmas was coming. "I can get those new drapes, I can get that new recliner," she thought.

So she agreed. "I can do it part-time, I said 'I'll do it for six months,'" she says. The job, she says, "chose me. I'm thankful for that."

"Six months turned into 41 years."

"It's my divine calling," she explains. "It's my assignment."

"I see the seniors come in, and it's a safe place for them," she says. "The TV does not answer you back. You can't get a warm hug" while home alone.

"You meet new friends," she says. "The staff will take you around to meet other people."

There is entertainment – who can forget the fire-throwing dancers during Hawaiian Day or the annual talent show competition? National Pizza Day doesn't go unnoticed. And National Chocolate Chip Day tends to be holy.

But it's not just about fun. Denise knows how important the center is to the people who need her the most.

"They know we care. They know they can trust us."

Mario Velez is one of the friendly faces behind the wheel of the City's #28 Northwest Focal Point Senior Center bus. Known affectionately as the *Doctor Taxi*, this free service helps Margate residents who are also Senior Center members get convenient transportation to their medical appointments in a safe and timely manner.

Weekday service begins at 9:45 a.m. and ends at noon. Eligible doctor's office destinations include Margate, North Lauderdale, Coconut Creek, Coral Springs, Parkland, and north Tamarac.

Q: How long have you worked for Northwest Focal Point Senior Center?

January 2026 will mark one year on the job for me here with the Senior Center.

Q: What is your main goal when driving seniors in and around Margate?

My main thing is safety. I make sure everyone has their seatbelt on, and I always drive slowly and carefully.

Q: What inspired you to start working with seniors?

When you start talking to them, they entertain you! I like asking questions about their pasts. There are always lessons to be learned.

Q: Are the seniors happy with the transportation service?

Yes! They make me sandwiches, they give me hugs. They say they appreciate it.

Q: Why is the work that you do important?

The seniors tell me they feel safe with me. They don't get sent to the wrong address or get stranded. I hope the service never ends. They really do need it.

CLEAN WORK, CLEAN CURBS: CONTRACTOR-GENERATED WASTE

When you hire someone to work on your home — such as a landscaper, roofer, or general contractor — they're responsible for taking the waste they generate with them. Don't let them leave it behind! Items like roofing debris and construction scraps don't belong on your curb.

FOLLOW THE CODE

Contractor-generated waste is not part of residential bulk or yard waste collection. Only household-generated items are eligible for pickup.

Contractors are responsible for removing the waste generated from their work! Following these rules helps prevent a visual mess in our community and avoids hazardous obstacles in the public rights-of-way.



KEEP OUR CANALS CLEAN

Keep your canal frontage clean, trim, and free of debris... it's the law and it keeps our beautiful waterways healthy.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE STANDARDS

Take a look at what the city's code says about canal right-of-way/easement maintenance for homeowners:

- Do not dump yard waste or debris into canals.
- Keep grass and/or weeds under 6 inches.
- Trim overhanging branches to be at least 12 feet clear above water.
- Maintain your seawall to keep canals and other bodies of water free of nuisance aquatic plants.

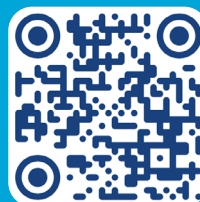
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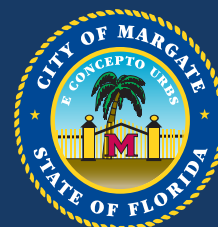
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
